- (a) all proposals for modification or variations of the plan of layout of the City of Canberra and its environs published in the <u>Commonwealth of</u> <u>Australia Gazette</u> on 19 November 1925, as previously modified or varied, which are referred to the committee by the Minister for Territories and Local Government, and
- (b) such matters relating to the Australian Capital Territory as may be referred to it by -
 - (i) resolution of either House of the Parliament, or
 - (ii) the Minister for Territories and Local Government.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee approves the variation at Bruce comprising the 80th Series. However, the Committee is concerned at the continuing lack of environmental protection legislation in the ACT covering matters such as air and water pollution and occupational health and safety.

The Committee recommends that the Ministers for Health and Territories and Local Government ensure that Water and Air Pollution, Radiation, Noise and Occupational Health and Safety Legislation be brought into operation in the ACT with a minimum of further delay.

Introduction

- 1. In the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette, 13 July 1983, the Minister for Territories and Local Government, the Hon. T. Uren, MP, pursuant to the powers conferred on him by section 12A of the <u>Seat of Government (Administration) Act 1910</u>, notified his intention to vary the plan of lay-out of the City of Canberra and its environs. Members of the public were invited to lodge objections in writing with the Secretary of the Department of Territories and Local Government within 21 days of the publication specifying the grounds of those objections.
- 2. As part of its policy to stimulate public interest in and discussion on the proposals, the Department of Territories and Local Government (DTLG) advertised the variations in The Canberra Times on 3 occasions between 16 July 1983 and 23 July 1983. Displays showing the proposals were arranged by DTLG at the Belconnen Mall, Monaro Mall, Woden Shopping Square, Cooleman Court, Dickson Library, and the Erindale Centre Library, Wanniassa.
- 3. On 12 July 1983, pursuant to paragraph 1(a) of the Resolution of Appointment of this Committee, the items contained in the Minister's proposals and designated the 80th Series of Variations, were formally referred by the Minister for investigation and report. The Minister's letter referring these proposals for the Committee's consideration is at Appendix I.
- 4. The Committee, in keeping with the practice established in the 30th Parliament, held public hearings on the proposals on II August 1983. Six witnesses, representing 4 organisations, appeared at the hearing. A list of the witnesses who appeared before the Committee is at Appendix II. The transcript of evidence given at those hearings will be available for inspection at the Committee Office of the House of Representatives and at the National Library.

- 5. The Committee is conscious of the role of the ACT House of Assembly as representing the views of the citizens of the ACT. A representative of the appropriate Committee of the House of Assembly usually appears before the Committee. Unfortunately, on this occasion it was not possible. However this Committee had the report from the ACT House of Assembly Standing Committee on Planning and Development on the 80th Series of Variations to the City Plan (Appendix III) available to it when considering this report. The House of Assembly Committee recommends approval of this variation to the City Plan.
- 6. The National Capital Development Commission and the DTLG supplied jointly prepared briefing notes which set out the background to the variations. These briefing notes form Appendix IV. For the sake of brevity, details contained in the briefing notes are not repeated, unless necessary, in the Committee's report. The briefing notes explain details of the variations such as the purpose, cost, existing and proposed development and the extent of community consultation. The Committee's Report should therefore be read in conjunction with the briefing notes and the transcript of evidence. The variation will not generate any cost to the Commonwealth because the costs of all land servicing is to be met by the developer.
- 7. During the hearing the Committee was also briefed by an officer of the Canberra Development Board and representatives of the Lend Lease Corporation which is developing Stage 1 of the project.

80th Series of Variations

- 8. The 80th Series of Variations consists of 1 item only, sponsored by the National Capital Development Commission, to provide access to Canberra Technology Park at Bruce.
- 9. The variation provides for partial deletion from the plan of Thynne Street and Eardley Crescent, previously gazetted but not yet constructed, and the addition of access routes to the Park from Haydon Drive and Battye Street. The addition of minor roads within the Park for access to individual sites is also included.
- 10. The variation will allow the development of the first stage (20ha) of the Canberra Technology Park by Lend Lease Corporation. The Park is being established to attract high technology industry to the ACT. The development is expected to generate 300 jobs during the construction phase and, when completed, provide Canberra with greater and more diverse employment opportunities. Estimates were given to the Committee of 700 to 1000 jobs being provided in the Park with a flow-on of employment in support facilities outside the Park.
- 11. The park is on a 100ha (240ac) site in Bruce bounded by Ginninderra Drive, Haydon Drive, Battye Street and Leverrrier Crescent. It is adjacent to the Canberra College of Advanced Education, the Bruce College of Technical and Further Education and the National Sports Centre.

12. The site includes:

- an existing light industrial development, Information Electronics Ltd;
- gazetted but not constructed Thynne Street and Eardley Crescent;

- two liky and 1/32kv transmission lines;
- a section of the cyclepath system.
- 13. The Committee was informed that it is not proposed to seek gazettal for the easterly extension of the internal loop road at this stage, since its precise location has not been established. It is also intended that a new access be provided to Ginninderra Drive at a later date. This access will also serve the National Sports Centre.
- 14. The costs of all land servicing is to be met by the developer. All building and landscape development is to be carried out by Lend Lease to standards approved by NCDC. It is intended that there will be a management body responsible for overall control of the Park including maintenance of 'public' areas. No objections were made to the proposal.
- 15. The Committee was told that the Canberra Technology Park is to be a modern high quality industrial estate in a landscaped park setting. The park is to provide sites for a range of industries involved with new technologies.
- 16. Heavy manufacturing plants, service trades, open storage uses, uses generating significant heavy vehicle movements, as well as noxious and offensive industries will generally not be eligible for sites. High technology, science based, research and development and other light industry, which can meet the requirements will be encouraged.
- 17. The briefing notes from NCDC and DTLG state
 "no...activities likely to create <u>environmental nuisance</u> will be
 permitted", yet it is envisaged that industries such as
 bio-technology and manufacturers of computers and electronic
 components will be located in the Park. As these industries do

use hazardous chemicals, such as solvents and other cleaners, the statement in the briefing notes in somewhat misleading. It is often assumed that high technology industries, in a garden setting, are clean industries with no pollution. However, overseas experience such as in Silicon Valley in California has proved otherwise

- 18. The polluton problems are minor and are capable of management, nevertheless, the nature of the possible hazards need to be adequately understood.
- 19. The Committee was informed that the ACT still lacks adequate environmental protection legislation to cover such areas as radiation, noise and air and water pollution. This legislation has been in the pipeline for a very long time. The Joint Committee on the Australian Capital Territory in its 1976 Report on Canberra City Wastes recommended that a radiation control ordinance be enacted immediately as it was a matter of "utmost priority". The ordinance has yet to be introduced. Some control is exercised through provisions inserted in the lease purpose clauses, but this is cumbersome and is not satisfactory for managing pollution matters on a Territory-wide basis.
- 20. The Committee was supplied with a list, in order of priority, of ACT legislation that is in the process of drafting (see Appendix IV). The Committee is very much concerned with the continuing delays in this environment protection legislation and feels there is an urgent need to have proper legislation introduced to protect workers, investors, the general public and the environment. The Committee was told by DTLG that: the Air Pollution (Stationary Sources) and Water Pollution ordinances would go before the House of Assembly by the end of August; the Dangerous Goods ordinance by the end of 1983; and the Noise Control Ordinance would go to the Assembly early in 1984. As the Occupational Health and Safety legislation is still being discussed with the Department of Employment and Industrial Relations, in relation to developing a long overdue national code, its introduction would appear to be some time off.

- 21. The Committee accepts the assurances of DTLG that basic environmental protection legislation, with the exception of occupational health and safety, will be in place by the time that the first industries move into Technology Park. On this basis, the Committee approves the variation.
- 22. The Committee recommends that the Ministers for Health and Territories and Local Government ensure that Water and Air Pollution, Radiation, Noise and Occupational Health and Safety Legislation be brought into operation in the ACT with a minimum of further delay.

The variation provides for partial deletion from the plan of Thynne Street and Eardley Crescent, previously gazetted but not yet constructed, and the addition of access routes to the Park from Haydon Drive and Battye Street. The addition of minor roads within the Park for access to individual sites is also included.

The Joint Committee on the ACT has currently under consideration the 79th series of variations to the City Plan. The variation proposals were published in the Gazette on 26 April 1983 and referred to the Committee for investigation and report on 16 May.

The 79th series comprise 12 items including the addition of roads in.

Kaleen for housing and community sites; the addition of several roads in Gilmore/Chisholm/Richardson to provide access to housing blocks and a school site; inclusion of a road in Deakin to provide access to diplomatic sites; addition of new roads and the adjustment of existing road reservations in Wanniassa to improve access to a major commercial site; changes to various roads in City to provide a site for the proposed development of a hotel/convention centre and offices and minor amendments to road reservations in Belconnen, Canberra Central District, Acton, Parkess and Garran.


VARIATION 1. (DETAIL MAP P5)

BRUCE, Sections 2, 5 and 10: Partial deletion from the plan of Thynne Street and Eardley Crescent, previously gazetted but not yet constructed, and the addition of several new roads to provide access to the proposed Canberra Technology Park. The variation provides for access to the Park from Haydon Drive and Battye Street and access to individual sites within the Park.

VARIATION 1

ERUCE, Sections 2, 5 and 10: Partial deletion from the plan of Thynne Street and Eardley Crescent, previously gazetted but not yet constructed, and the addition of several new roads to provide access to the proposed Canberra Technology Park.

The variation provides for access to the Park from Haydon Drive and Battye Street and access to individual sites within the Park.



BRUCE - THYNNE STREET AND EARDLEY CRESCENT ROAD ADDITIONS AND DELETIONS

Purpose

To allow the development of the first stage of the Camberra Technology Park by Lend Lease Corporation Ltd.

2. Length/Area

Approximately 1.5 kilometres of new road are proposed to replace the existing gazetted roads Eardley Crescent and part of Thynne Street which were gazetted in the 56-59A Series.

3. Estimated Cost

Nil. All land servicing costs are to be met by the developer, who is to be responsible for carrying out this work.

4. Existing Development

The area concerned, bounded by Battye Street, Haydon Drive, Ginninderra Drive and the site of the National Sports Centre, is vacant Commonwealth land with the exception of one site (Block 1 Section 2) leased to Information Electronics Ltd. There are no existing constructed roads within the area. A 132ky electricity transmission line and two 11ky lines cross the northern part of the area near Ginninderra Drive.

Proposed Development

Approximately 20 hectares of land fronting Haydon Drive is to be leased to Lend Lease Corporation Ltd for the development of the first stage of the Camberra Technology Park. The project is intended to be an industrial estate with high quality buildings in a landscaped setting.

Particular Planning Considerations


It is not proposed to seek gazettal for the easterly extension of the interal 'loop' road at this stage, since its precise location has not been established. It is also intended that a new access be provided to Ginninderra Drive at a later date. This access will also serve the National Sports Centre.

Environmental Considerations

No heavy manufacturing industry nor activities likely to create environmental nuisance will be permitted. All building and landscape development is to be carried out by Lend Lease to standards approved by the Commission. It is intended that there will be a management body responsible for overall control of the Park including maintenance of 'public' areas.

8. Public Participation

The proposals are consistent with the Commission's previously announced intentions for this area and there are no existing premises in the vicinity which are likely to be adversely affected by the development. It is not therefore proposed to undertake further public consultation.

INTRODUCTION

The Standing Committee on Planning and Development has examined the 80th Series of Variations to the Canberra City Plan, contained in the Commonwealth of Australia Gazette No. 5146 of 13 July 1983.

2. The Committee was briefed on the proposal on 25 July by officers of the National Capital Development Commission and the Department of Territories and Local Government. The Committee wishes to once again express its appreciation to these officers for their co-operation and assistance.

PROPOSED VARIATION

- 3. The 80th Series comprises a single variation at sections 2,5 and 10 in Bruce. The variation provides for deletion from the plan of Thynne Street and Eardley Crescent, previously Gazetted but not yet constructed, and the addition of several new roads to provide access to the proposed Canberra Technology Park. The variation also provides for access to the Park from Haydon Drive and Battye Street, and for access to individual sites within the Park.
- 4. The Committee was informed that the Technology Park is to proceed in two stages. The proposed variation will form the first part of an eventual loop road that will service all sites in the Technology Park. Additions to the loop road for the second stage of the Park development, to be Gazetted at a later stage, will also provide additional access to and from the National Sports Centre.
- 5. The Committee has resolved to recommend approval of this variation to the City Plan, which is not in itself contentious. The Committee has however asked the Department of Territories and Local Government to supply further information on the establishment of the Technology Park, and will be giving consideration to some matters in connection with how the Park might operate vis-a-vis similar parks interstate. Should it prove necessary the Committee will report to the Assembly on these matters in due course.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 7. The Committee recommends:
 - That the 80th Series of Variations to the City Plan is approved; and
 - (2) That this Report and recommendations be transmitted by Message to the Minister.
